

- The Marion and John E. Anderson Pavilion is seven stories and 460,000 square feet—the size of almost 100 NBA basketball courts.
- It is licensed for 317 beds, 85 percent of which are in private rooms.
- More than one-third of beds are intensive care beds, a 40 percent increase over previous capacity, to meet growing demand.
- The building's design is based on the varied California landscape, with each floor featuring a different region, from the desert to the ocean to a child's own backyard.
- The Anderson Pavilion is a model environment for family-centered care; every aspect of the building has been designed with families in mind.
- Each room features a daybed, allowing parents or caregivers to stay at the bedside with their child.
- The total cost for the Anderson Pavilion was \$636 million—the sixth-largest construction project in Los Angeles in 2010.
- The building is located on the Children's Hospital campus, situated at the corner of Sunset Boulevard and Lyman Avenue.
- Patients, families and staff dine at the HBO Café, a Hollywood-themed dining space featuring large windows and outdoor seating on the Ralph M. Parsons Foundation Dining Terrace, overlooking the Simms/Mann Family Foundation Playground in the Jane Vruwink Palmer Healing and Play Garden, where children of all abilities can play side by side.
- Patients with compromised immune systems can breathe easier knowing the building is High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA)-filtered.
- The Maurice Marciano Family Foundation Emergency Department and Trauma Center features 26 private exam rooms. A recent anonymous philanthropic gift of \$20 million is allowing the unit to expand by 30 percent, providing 11 additional examination bays, updated equipment and a larger waiting area to accommodate dramatic increases in demand over recent years.
- Rooms in the Anderson Pavilion's Cardiothoracic Intensive Care Unit and Pediatric Intensive Care Unit are each equipped with a ceiling-mounted boom carrying equipment to allow for bedside procedures, if necessary.
- To help families learn and take charge of their children's health, the Anderson Pavilion features the Helen and Bill Close Family Resource Center, with multilingual information on treatments and services.
