Commitment to Education

The program is committed to resident education. In addition to learning from our diverse patient experiences, and the eLearning resources, the program provides a weekly block of teaching conferences that are protected. Faculty provide teaching via lectures or interactive modalities during these sessions that cover the scope of pediatrics. This is in addition to other teaching conferences throughout the week that complement the daily teaching by faculty on rounds.

In addition, the program incorporates board review, journal club, and mock codes during these sessions. Clinical coverage is provided by hospitalists, fellows and faculty during this time. We also frequently utilize the Simulation center to practice procedures and critical decision making skills.

PL-1

Year 1

During the PL1 year, interns are exposed to a broad spectrum of general pediatric conditions in a well-supervised, supportive environment. Each intern works closely with a second or third year pediatric resident on the primary care services under the guidance of a full-time faculty member.

PL-2

Year 2

During the PL2 year, residents get increased patient care responsibilities and serve as supervisors for interns and medical students on primary care services. Residents begin to develop career-based goals with the ability to select subspecialty electives.

PL-3

Year 3

PL3's increasingly develop treatment plans and manage patients in a more independent manner with faculty supervision. With additional subspecialty and elective blocks, residents build upon the foundations laid in PL-1 and 2 years, assuming more leadership in quality improvement, advocacy or research, based on individual interests or career paths.

Research

Faculty research efforts are diverse and are supported by various organizations including the National Institutes of Health, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, non-profit research foundations such as the March of Dimes and American Heart Association, and industry-sponsored grants. Residents have the opportunity to develop research interests alongside faculty.
